

I know I have not arrived; but there's one thing I am doing: I'm leaving my old life behind, putting everything on the line for this mission. I press on toward the goal, toward the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus. – Philippians 3:13-14

How is your Church Council "pressing on toward the goal"? On September 11 immediately after accepting the resignation of Rev. Andrew Ponder Williams, the Council met with Rev. Paul Sangree, Associate Conference Minister, to begin planning a path forward. We approved a Council letter to accompany Rev. Ponder Williams' Letter to the Congregation. We appointed a sub-committee to review and update the Interim Profile Letter from 2020 and we planned for a Council-led service of worship for Sunday, September 17. The Council letter,

along with Pastor Andrew's letter, was mailed to the Congregation on September 12 and emailed to the Constant Contact list on Friday, September 15.

Pastor Andrew's impending departure was announced publicly during worship on September 17 in Moderator, Phil Brown's message. The sub-committee working on the Interim Profile Letter met and exchanged email several times during the last two weeks of September and presented a final draft of the letter to the Council on October 2. The Council made a few amendments to the Interim Profile Letter and approved the letter for submission to the Vermont Conference office during the meeting. <u>https://www.dropbox.com/scl/fi/1pd7ciguo1bd7aeylnswy/Profile-Letter-for-Interim-9-26-23.docx?rlkey=286s07a5d55r863w3kbqg9o68&dl=0.</u> This Profile was forwarded to the Conference office on Tuesday, October 3. The Conference will distribute this Profile to interested Interim candidates. It is the Council's hope to interview candidates and Call an Interim Pastor by the 1st of the year.

For the immediate future we will need to contract for Pulpit Supply. The Council was presented with a proposal for an "Interim to the Interim" at our October 2 meeting. This proposal would have Rev. Steve Winkler (ret.) and Rev. Jay Sprout (ret.) cover a large portion of our pulpit supply needs until an Interim Pastor is Called. In addition, Jay and Steve are willing to provide pastoral care as needed and assist with an Advent Bible Study. The Council discussed this proposal at length and voted to accept this offer. Our hope is that this plan will provide some needed consistency and comfort during this time of transition.



We will have a time for Congregational Conversation following worship on Sunday, October 8. During this time we will answer questions, listen to the thoughts and feelings of the congregation and work together on a plan for the future. Our hope is that we can recruit and identify candidates for a Search Committee that can be approved at a Congregational Meeting in early November. Because the previous Search Committee completed a full Church Profile just 2 years ago, the new Search Team should be able to make the necessary revisions and submit the Profile to the Conference in early 2024.

Despite the challenges we face as a congregation, we continue to be an attractive church and community for pastoral candidates. I believe this church will be able to Call a new Settled Pastor within a year. One of the things that makes us attractive to pastoral candidates is our willingness and

ability to work together to address challenges, create and manage events, and carry out our mission in the community. That willingness to work together as the Body of Christ will carry us through this transition and keep United Community Church vital and growing in ministry into the years ahead.


Spiritual Formation & Nurture

Stewardship




Garrett's property management has been very






